HON252: Honors in Arts and Creativity-Curiosity

(2 Times)

Description: This course is designed to allow honors students the chance to explore the role of curiosity in higher education and life-long learning. Students consider curiosity from a psychological and cognitive perspective, while exploring how curiosity intersects with parenting, education, empathy, and creativity. Additionally, students engage in a creative writing project where they explore their own

curiosity. The goal of this team-taught course is to help us understand curiosity broadly and deeply, and how we can foster it in ourselves and others.

GS 620 Teaching in the 21st Century: Inspiring Curiosity in the Classroom (1Times) Description: This class explores what curiosity is, its place in academia/the classroom, and ways of inspiring curiosity in your classroom. Through discussion-based classes, visiting speakers, readings and teaching presentations, this course was designed for graduate students interested in having careers in academia.

WRD 110: Composition and Communication I (4 Times) Description: Course designed around teaching concepts of inquiry and research. Students work individually and in groups to research a local space, organization, or event in Kentucky and communicate their research in speeches and multimodal projects throughout the semester with blogs, podcasts, and documentaries.

WRD 110 (Online): Composition and Communication I

Description: Online course designed around inquiry and research. Students research and analyze a space local to them and communicate their research with video speeches, blogs, and essays.

WRD 111: Composition and Communication II

(7 Times) Description: Course focused on concepts of research and argumentation. Students research, analyze arguments, and compose arguments around the rhetoric of advertising individually and in groups. Projects include speeches, essays, and the creation of their own ad using the multimedia genre of their choosing.

WRD 112: Advanced Composition and Communication

Description: Focused on the rhetoric of advertising, students work individually and in groups to learn the concepts of inquiry, research, and argumentation. This is an honors course that combines curriculum goals from WRD 110 and WRD 111. Projects include speeches, essays, and the creation of their own ad using the multimedia genre of their choosing.

ENG 280: Introduction to Film

Description: A writing intensive course designed to introduce the basic concepts of film techniques, terminology, and visual analysis. This course exposed students to a wide range of cinema from the past to the present day. Projects included a class wiki of terms, exams on terms and techniques, essays, and a "sweded" film or genre-shifting video project.

Description: Worked with a small group of new UK TAs on various teaching assistantship assignments to orient them towards working with students. Orientation included overviewing concepts of effective classroom teaching, recorded video teaching demo, and feedback from group and leader.
